

CAN WE UNDERSTAND THE BIBLE ALIKE?

Of all the themes in the New Testament, the unity of all believers is among the most predominant. In fact, pleas for unity in the faith and in understanding the word of God resound throughout the scriptures. Jesus Himself prays for unity when he speaks to God on behalf of the apostles, entreating that they be "one" so "that the world may believe that you have sent me..." (John 17:20-23).

Professing disciples in every age have expected their own prayers to be heard but have shown little interest in responding to Jesus' prayer for unity. Some say embracing all belief systems will lead to unity, but this conclusion ignores Jesus' earlier teaching that God's word is the basis for unity (John 17:17

The apostle Paul made a similar plea in 1 Corinthians 1:10, "...speak the same thing... that there be no divisions among you, but that you be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment." While some find many bodies, faiths and baptisms acceptable, the Holy Spirit speaks of "one body...one faith, [and] one baptism" (Ephesians 4:4-5; Jude 3).

We can "speak the same thing" only if we "rightly divide the word of God" (2 Timothy 2:15) and determine whether or not a word, phrase, or passage is used literally. Failing to do so leads inevitably to doctrinal error and division.

Howard Hendricks' Living by the Book and D. R. Dungan's Hermeneutics provide commonly accepted rules to use in recognizing figurative language in the Bible. Consider one of these rules: a word or sentence is figurative when the literal meaning is impossible. Always take the literal sense unless

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the literal sense makes nonsense. In John 3:3, Jesus says, "Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God." We cannot literally re-enter our mother's womb. The new birth is figurative: one born of water and of the spirit (John 3:5) arises from the waters of baptism a new creature; hence, Jesus' figure directly implies baptism is required to enter the kingdom of God.

Jesus says in Luke 9:60, "Let the dead bury the dead." A dead man cannot bury another dead man, so, we know "figurative language" is employed. Jesus is saying the spiritually dead should bury the physically dead.

In 1 Corinthians 11:26, Paul writes, "For as often as you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death till He comes." We cannot drink a literal cup, so figurative language (metonymy) is used to refer to the literal contents of a literal cup. Warning: figurative use of a word in one place does not redefine the meaning of the word.

Sermon #1076 Jesus' Impact on the World If a man tells his wife the kettle is boiling, he must refer to the contents, not the kettle. The husband could later ask his wife where she got the kettle. Since the second use of kettle can be taken literally, it must be taken literally.

Similarly, we know Jesus used baptism figuratively when he asked, "Are you able to be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with?" We cannot superimpose that figurative use on a passage where baptism can be taken literally. The literal meaning of baptism, incidentally, is to dip, plunge or immerse in water or in some other liquid. This definition is critical, for instance, in Galatians 3:27 where the Bible says, "For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ." Does literal baptism make nonsense here? No! Therefore, we must take this passage as a literal reference to baptism.

We must distinguish between literal and figurative language to understand the Bible alike. Arbitrarily picking and choosing which words and expressions are figurative is really squeezing the Scriptures into a preconceived doctrinal mold. It will result in an inconsistent application of rules of interpretation, and we will be reading into the Biblical text instead of getting out of the Bible what God intended.
